

gone by. I found a few interesting facts about Christmas. For the most part, the early Church did not celebrate Christmas, Easter yes, but not Christmas. It was believed that the date of Jesus birth was first identified by Sextus Julius Africanus in 221. December 25 was the day of dies solis invicti nati (the day of the birth of the unconquered sun), a popular holiday in the Roman Empire that celebrated the winter solstice as a symbol of the resurgence of the sun, the casting away of winter and the heralding of the rebirth of spring and summer. For a long time, the celebration of Jesus' birth was observed in conjunction with his baptism, celebrated January 6, notably the Feast of the Epiphany. Christmas began to be widely celebrated with a specific liturgy in the 9th century. (source: Encyclopedia Brittanica). Today in America, Christmas is associated with gift giving, decoration of trees, baking of goods, etc. More so, our hope is that those who call themselves Christian celebrate the birth of Christ.

Some Christmas facts, I found interesting:

Dear Parishioners-

Each year, 30-35 million real Christmas trees are sold in the United States. There are 21,000 Christmas tree growers in the United States, and trees grow for about 15 years before they are sold. Today, in the Greek and Russian Orthodox churches, Christmas is celebrated 13-14 days after the 25th. This is because the Western churches use the Gregorian calendar (Pope St. Gregory the Great), while the Eastern Churches use the Julian Calendar. As a side note, the Christmas season begins on December 25 and ends at the Feast of the Baptism of the Lord (this year, January 12). Christmas was declared a federal holiday in the United States on June 26, 1870.

The first eggnog made in the United States was consumed in Captain John Smith's 1607 Jamestown settlement.

Poinsettia plants are named after Joel R. Poinsett, an American minister to Mexico, who brought the red and green plant from Mexico to America in 1828.

The Salvation Army has been sending Santa Claus clad donation collectors into the streets since the 1890s.

Construction workers started the Rockefeller Center Christmas tree tradition in 1931.

When Christmas was cancelled: 1659-1681, the celebration of Christmas was outlawed in Boston, and law breakers were fined five shillings.
